From the South or West of Mount Pleasant

Take I-26 East towards Charleston. Merge onto US-17 North via Exit 220 toward Mount Pleasant. Cross over the Arthur Ravenel/Cooper River Bridge. Once on the Mount Pleasant side of the bridge, merge right onto W. Coleman Blvd/SC-703. Cross Shem Creek and merge right onto Whilden Street, behind the Scotchman Gas Station. Take 2nd right onto Hibben Street and the church is the 3rd structure on your right.

From the North of Mount Pleasant

Take US-17 South towards Charleston. Exit off of US-17 South onto Chuck Dawley Blvd, toward SC-703. Get in the right lane which veers onto Coleman Blvd. Chuck Dawley Blvd dead ends at the stoplight at Royall Ace Hardware, where from the right lane you yield onto Coleman Blvd/SC-703. Turn left onto Hibben Street at the Half Moon Outfitters. The church will be ahead, one block on your right.

SESSION #1 9:00AM-10:15AM

1-A: Board of Pensions Benefits Overview - T. Clark Simmons

This class will discuss in depth the benefits of the Board of Pensions. These includes medical, pension, death, disability,403b and other benefits that are offered. Those who attend should be Plan Members or those who need to know about benefits. *Read Clark's bio on the featured leaders page.*

1-B: Casting Out Fear- Maggie Beamguard

Drawing from scripture, personal experience, and the work of Scott Bader-Saye in Following Jesus in a Culture of Fear, we will consider the ways politics, news programs, and popular culture market fear. We will explore Scripture's invitation to risk love, generosity, peacemaking, and hospitality in what seems like an increasingly fearful world. We will look for examples of "perfect love" which "casts out all fear" in our faith communities, current events, literature, and film. 1-C: Clerks of Session- Janis K. Blocker

This workshop is designed to provide clerks with instructions for recording accurate and complete minutes. Each clerk will receive a checklist of items required for inclusion in minutes and a template for stated and special meetings of sessions and congregations. Other responsibilities of clerk will be shared. Janis K. Blocker, a resident of Round O and a life-long member of Bethel Presbyterian in Walterboro, has served Bethel as clerk of Session Council since 2001. She was appointed recording clerk of presbytery in 1988 and has served in that position continuously. She was moderator of Charleston Presbytery in 1979 and of Charleston Atlantic Presbytery in 1998 and a commissioner to the General Assembly in 1978 and 1996. Member and clerk of the Commission on Ministry, she has also served through the years on numerous committees and units including Church and Society Ministry Unit, Coordinating Council, and Permanent Judicial Commission. She has served on administrative commissions and on ordination and installation commissions. Currently, she is a reader for the ordination exams. A graduate of the S.C. Lay School of Theology, she has served as the registrar for the school since 2000. She retired in 2011 after 37 years as a high-school English teacher in Colleton County but continues to teach part-time. The Walterboro-Colleton Chamber of Commerce presented her with the "Excellence in Education Award" and the "Lifetime Achievement Award" in recognition of her service to education and the community.

1-D: Cultivating A Healthier Church Culture for a Healthier World- Karen and Travis Webster

2-N: Semper Reformanda: Always Being Reformed- Mark Douglas

500 years after it began, the Protestant Reformation continues to shape provocative patterns of human insight and useful strategies for social engagement- even if those patterns and strategies look a bit different than we sometimes imagine. This workshop explores some of the distinct insights of Reformed ethics for contemporary public engagement. *Read Mark's bio on the featured leaders page*.

2-O: The Spiritual: The Voice of the People- Charles Frost

This workshop will examine the African-American Spiritual. We will see how the Spiritual was used to express people's feelings as well as a method for communication. We will look at the Spirituals which have been included in *Glory to God*. Charles Frost began his music studies at an early age playing the organ and directing choirs in churches as a high school sophomore. He has a Bachelor's Degree and Master's Degree of Music in Church Music. Charles currently serves as Minister of Music, organist and choir director at the Sea Island Presbyterian Church in Beaufort, SC. He served on the "Glory to God" hymnal committee.

2-P: Transition Tips and Tricks (Children Ages of Preschool, Pre-K, K, 1st)- Jean Feldman

Transitions are all those "in between" times when things tend to get out of control. This workshop will present positive ways to focus children's attention with songs, finger plays, props, and games. Ideas for circle time, clean up, focusing children's attention, and releasing wiggles will be addressed. Highlights will include: circle time songs and learning activities; chants and tunes for guiding children; hocus pocus focus; and rhymes and finger plays to engage children. *Read Dr. Jean's bio on the featured leaders page*.

SESSION #3 2:15PM-3:30PM

3-A: Adult Education Galore- Malinda Spencer

This workshop will be a bird's eye view of adult education, with specific tips on structuring classes, mentoring facilitators, and choosing curriculum.

Malinda Spencer is the associate for curricula training and promotion for Congregational Ministries Publishing, in the Presbyterian Mission Agency. She is a ruling elder and Christian educator who has worked with congregations of many sizes and settings.

3-B: The Art of Kintsugi: Finding Beauty in Brokenness- Patricia B. Jones

The art of Kintsugi takes broken pottery, china, or valuable heirlooms and secures them back together with real gold and lacquers, thus highlighting the breaks and creating something different and in some regards even more valuable. Brokenness is an expected and normal experience in every human being. The art of Kintsugi is an exercise, tool, a spiritual practice for moving toward what has been broken and to work with the breaks as a way to make it part of one's story. Participants must bring a porcelain or china cup, saucer or a piece of tile that has significant meaning to them to the workshop. The attendee will have to break their item, and then put it back together with glue and gold paint. (Limited to 12 participants). Patricia Jones is a ruling elder at St. James Presbyterian Church and is a candidate for ordered ministry with the Charleston Atlantic Presbytery.

3-C: Presbyterian Women's 2017-18 Horizons Bible Study: Cloud of Witnesses: The Community of Christ in Hebrews- Pie Mikell

This workshop will include an introduction to the Book of Hebrews as well as an overview of the *Horizons* study written by Melissa Bane Sevier. The author takes a thematic approach to studying this often ignored book of the Bible. Each of the nine lessons will focus on a major theme found in Hebrews and explore how it relates to community. *Pie Mikell is Charleston Atlantic Presbytery's Associate for Congregational Nurture and Service to Others.*

3-D: Recreation Across the Ages- Liv Looney Cappelmann

Are you looking for meaningful ways to create intergenerational experiences amongst your congregation? Join us as we look at different models of recreation for all ages and abilities. What a gift to see God's youngest and oldest children and all those in between engaging one another in meaningful conversations through recreation and play. 3-G: Theology on Tap- Colin Kerr

In 2007, a few friends came together for "Talks on Tap" – a safe place to talk theology, philosophy, and politics over a couple drinks. It is now Charleston's longest running public forum. Since then, similar groups supported by local churches have taken off all over the Charleston area. How can your church effectively partner with an already existing group or start your own theology on tap in your neighborhood? Join us for a pint just a few minutes from the church at Juanita Greenbergs Nacho Royale to find out. Colin is the planter and director of Journey: A Worshiping Community for College Students, which is Charleston Atlantic Presbytery's collegiate mission. He is author of three books and has also been a contributor in the Charleston Post and Courier, Presbymergent, Patheos, and Relevant Magazine. If you cannot find Colin in Kudu Coffee, your next best bet is anywhere where there is beach volleyball and surfing. He's married to a very feisty nurse and bartender named Alexis and is currently a seminarian at University of Dubuque Theological Seminary.

3-H: The Trade Game- Jeff Kackley

What's the difference between Free Trade and Fair Trade? What types of human and environmental impacts occur when trade is "free" but not "fair"? Rather than a lecture, participants in this workshop will "play" a trade simulation game based on one to three real world scenarios in which the Presbyterian Hunger Program and the PCUSA have been actively involved in dealing with the aftermaths. Jeff Kackley is the pastor of Dorchester Presbyterian Church in Summerville. He grew up on a farm and taught eight years as an Agriculture Teacher before going to seminary. He serves as the Chair of the PCUSA Presbyterian Hunger Program Advisory Committee where his service has helped him to see first-hand a variety of models for community gardens, and the effects of the global free-market trade. Jeff has a BS degree in Agriculture Education from Virginia Tech.

3-I: With Sighs too Deep for Words: Meditation in Devotional Life- Tom Herrington

Meditation- also known as contemplative prayer- can be a rich part of the Christian devotional life, but is often forgotten or neglected. We will take a look at Scriptural references to this ancient practice, as well as "trying" some different types of meditation. Tom Herrington is the Associate Pastor for Pastoral Care at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church. He also received a MA in in counseling, and spent six years as a hospice grief counselor, an dhas included meditation as part of his prayer life for almost thirty years.

3-J: Youth- Healthy and Whole: Worship with Our Bodies- Emily Oswald

This course for high school youth will be half workshop and half workout/demonstration (so wear supportive shoes and clothes that are comfortable to move in). We spend a significant amount of time caring for our spiritual health, but does God say about our bodies physically? Being healthy and whole comes from training our whole selves- mind, body, soul and spirit. In training our spiritual and physical fitness we are better equipped to live out the two greatest commandments that Jesus gave- to love God with our whole heart, soul, mind, and strength and to love others as ourselves. (Mark 12:28-32) This class is limited to 25 participants. *Emily Oswald has been a certified fitness professional for over 26 years. She is a fitness teacher, gospel preacher with Revelation Wellness, a non-profit ministry devoted to helping others live heathy and whole lives in Christ. Emily is an elder for Adult Discipleship and Sunday school teacher at James Island Presbyterian Church.*
